<p>Writing effective UCAS references Presented by Jen Barton, Student Recruitment Manager at Durham University and Lesley Stokes, Widening Participation Manager at the University of Edinburgh</p>	<p>For many universities, the UCAS reference is an important tool in the admissions process. The reference may not only provide information about an applicant's suitability for university study, but is also a valuable opportunity to put an applicant's academic achievement in context. What exactly do competitive universities want to see in UCAS references though, and what are some of the common errors that they see – and how can they be avoided? This session will answer these questions, using examples to facilitate discussion and feedback.</p>

We will discuss employability, transferrable skills and why Arts graduates are sought after by employers to challenge the myth that studying these subjects does not lead to good/profitable careers.</p>

It will also look at the various bursaries students can apply for and what a scholarship means.
