- Black, Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) students
- mature students
- disabled students
- care leavers
- carers
- people estranged from their families
- people from Gypsy, Roma and Traveller communities
- refugees
- children from military families.

Why do universities want to support underrepresented students?

Part of widening participation activity

Account for social and educational disadvantages

Generate a diverse study body that represents society

Ensures students are not limited in their ambitions

Regulatory directives stipulated by the OfS

Help to contribute to greater diversity in all levels of society

• Eliminate the gap in participation at highertariff providers between the most and least represented groups by 2038-39 • To eliminate the unexplained gap in noncontinuation between most and least represented groups by 2024-25, and to eliminate the absolute gap by 2030-31

- To eliminate the unexplained gap in degree outcomes (1sts or 2:1s) between white students and black students by 2024-25, and to eliminate the absolute gap by 2030-31
- Reducing the gap in degree outcomes (1sts or 2:1s) between disabled students and nondisabled students

• 60 per cent of students to go on to further study, professional work, or other positive outcomes, within 15 months of graduating





Pre-entry outreach support

BIRMINGHAM

Offered in many shapes and sizes

Run by:

- Universities
- Charitable organisations
- National partnerships
- Regional partnerships

Consist of:

- Subject specific
- General
- Specific groups

Targeted at Primary through to Post-16 and mature learners



Contextual admissions

Contextual admissions is the practice of using additional information, such as where a potential student lives or which school they go to, to assess their attainment and potential.

Offers can be made on the basis of contextual data or participation in an outreach event. This might include:

- an offer based on advertised grades
- an offer at a grade or more lower than advertised
- an unconditional offer
- an offer linked to a foundation year.





On-course support



Additional funding

Money towards living costs May also contribute to travel, accommodation, fees etc

Enhanced inductions

Give students a 'head start' Opportunity to network and get to know the campus





Peer mentoring

Meet other students from similar backgrounds

Create networks and friendships







Academic support

Drop-in sessions on different topics Study skills sessions

Enhanced careers support Flagged internships Networking with employers Support with CVs and assessment centres

Access Support

- Alternate offer (typically two grades below standard)
- Extra consideration from Admissions
- Interview support

Transition Support

- Study skill development
- Increase university awareness and readiness

Financial Support - Chamberlain Award £2000/year -P2B Scholarship £1500/year





Contextual Offers

Nationwide opportunity

Recognises the potential of students whose personal circumstances may have restricted achievement

For students in certain home postcodes or those who have spent time in care

One grade reduction in the standard offer

Automatically applied if an offer is received

UNIVERSITY OF LEEDS: ACCESS TO LEEDS



Applicants could be eligible to a reduced grade offer if:

- They are from a household with an annual income of £25,000 or below OR in receipt of 16-19 Bursary Fund or Discretionary Learner Support with an income threshold of £25,000 OR in receipt of free school meals during your GCSE studies
- Their parents did not go to university
- They attended a school achieving below the national average at GCSE (Attainment 8 score)
- They live in an area with low progression to higher education (use our online postcode checker)
- They live or grew up in public care

Beyond undergraduate study

- Universities recognise that disadvantage in access isn't just at undergraduate level
- Challenges in access at masters and PhD levels

- New areas of work looking at progression to PhD study from disadvantaged groups
