What are contextual offers and why do they exist?







Widening participation strategies

- Contextual offers exist as part of Widening participation strategies (WP). These strategies help underrepresented groups to access further or higher education to continue their education.
- Sometimes the term 'access and participation' is also used. This has a broader definition encompassing access to university to begin with as well as ensuring that disadvantaged students succeed whilst at university and progress to positive destinations afterwards.
- By looking at your achievements in context, universities may adjust their usual offer to give you a fair chance to access your chosen course – these are called 'contextual offers'.


Contextual offers eligibility

The eligibility criteria will vary from one university to another – it's important to check before applying.

Examples of circumstances considered:

- Where students live if students live in an area where there is a high level of deprivation, or a low number of people going to university. This is usually decided by postcode (check your postcode on the Office for Students' website).
- School or college if your school's academic performance is lower than the national average, or a small number of pupils go on to higher education.
- Outreach Programmes If students have participated in certain outreach programmes.
- Parental education if your parents did not attend university.
- If you have spent time in local authority care, such as a foster home, residential children's home or kinship care.
- If you are estranged from your parents if your relationship has broken down leading to no contact.
- If you have caring responsibilities those who are unpaid carers for a family member or friend.
- If you have a disability or mental health condition including learning differences and long-term health conditions.

Most universities consider POLAR4

The participation of local areas (POLAR) classification groups areas across the UK based on the proportion of young people who participate in higher education.

It looks at how likely young people are to participate in higher education across the UK and shows how this varies by area.


Below you can select a measure to see the area used to calculate the quintile for your postcode. Measures that use the same geographic areas are grouped.

How much is the contextual offer reduction?

It varies – this will be dependent on higher education providers/universities

Examples:

- Bristol up to two grades below the standard entry requirements
- Queen Mary up to three grades below the standard entry requirements









How do students with contextual offers perform?







How do students with contextual offers perform?

Groups qualifying for contextual offers are less likely to:

- Be made an offer
- Continue their studies
- Attain a top result







How do students with contextual offers perform?

- 90.9% contextual offers students received a 2:1 or 1st
- 91.1% of standard offer recipients
- 94.7% of contextual offer students continue their studies
- 95.4% of standard offer holders







What support is available?







What additional support is available?

- Pre-application programmes
 - Summer Schools
 - Mentoring programmes
 - Advice on applying / making the transition
- Lower contextualized offer
- Guaranteed offers/interviews
- Financial support such as bursaries









What additional support is available?

- Enhanced support with accommodation
- Additional support for commuters
- Enhanced and appropriate advice, counselling and wellbeing support
- Enhanced and specific study support peer mentors, coaches etc.
- Welcome and community building events







How best can teachers and advisors help?

- Contextual offer status is private
- Most contextual offers are assessed using information given to UCAS
 - Do self-declare FSM or disability on the UCAS form
 - Personal Statements and Teachers' References (including new boxes) won't automatically be read by every university
- Advise that research is everything
- Encourage them to email university enquiries' teams
